MoMA Redraws Its Expansion Plan

The Museum of Modern Art has decided to forgo the retractable glass wall. And it no longer plans to install a floor that moves up and down, or a new entrance to its sculpture garden.

Responding to criticism, the museum and its architecture firm, Diller Scofidio + Renfro, have dropped the splashiest elements of the expansion plan they revealed two years ago.

Instead, the design now gets to the business of making the museum work better for visitors and curators: more and varied gallery spaces, a less-congested lobby, a faster coatcheck line.

And the plan now has a price tag: an estimated \$400 million for new construction and soft costs, plus \$40 million
